



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
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How to Use This Guide:

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
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About the Film Series

JIG SHOW | Leon Claxton's Harlem in Havana is an engaging 8-part documentary series streaming for free on YouTube. It uncovers the untold story of **Harlem in Havana**, a groundbreaking Black and Cuban traveling revue that captivated audiences from the 1930s through the 1960s.

Filmmaker **Leslie Cunningham** embarks on a personal journey to reclaim the legacy of her grandfather, **Leon Claxton**, a visionary producer and cultural pioneer. This series offers a rich resource for classrooms exploring history, culture, and performance.



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

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
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Learning Objectives

Students will:

- Explore cultural resistance through performance.
- Analyze intersections of race, gender, and public spectacle.
- Reflect on archival storytelling and historical erasure.
- Investigate the evolution of carnival culture and girl shows.




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Episode Planning & Discussion Questions



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Episode Planning (Synopses).

- **Episode 1: Family Legacy in Lights: From Bally to Brown Skin Showgirls**
Leslie Cunningham travels to Tampa to uncover her family's hidden history with her grandmother Shirley Bates and father John Cunningham. Features burlesque legend Bebe Bardeaux and showgirl Aquarius Moon.
- **Episode 2: Introducing The Showman**
Explores Claxton's rise as a pioneering Black producer defying Jim Crow, with Leslie uncovering her own family secret and reclaiming erased history.
- **Episode 3: Claxton Takes the Stage**
Chronicles Claxton's early career from Memphis contortionist to a Chicago stage producer, highlighting his success at the 1934 World's Fair and influence on carnival culture.
- **Episode 4: Sisters, Stars & the Birth of Harlem in Havana**
Introduces the Bates Sisters and the creation of Harlem in Havana, blending Afro-Cuban and Black artistry amid wartime shifts.


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Episode Planning (Synopses)

- **Episode 5: Jim Crow on the Road – Life on Train Car 66**
Dramatizes the touring life amidst segregation, dangers, and resilience, featuring Shirley Bates' emotional departure from the revue.
- **Episode 6: Behind the Curtain – Change is Coming**
Examines backstage life as Civil Rights and Cuban Revolution pressures reshape the show's future.
- **Episode 7: The Fall of the Revue**
Details the revue's decline and Claxton's pivot to business, with risqué performances that challenged norms.
- **Episode 8: Legacy in Motion**
Reflects on the personal and cultural legacy of Harlem in Havana through the eyes of surviving cast members.



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Episode 1: Family Legacy in Lights: From Bally to Brown Skin Showgirls

Synopsis: Leslie Cunningham interviews her grandmother Shirley Bates, a former exotic dancer, and her father John Cunningham, tracing family stories and performance legacy.

Themes: Intergenerational memory, performance legacy, oral history.

Discussion Questions:

- What role does family storytelling play in preserving history?
- How are Black women reclaiming the burlesque stage today



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
Episode 2: Introducing the Showman

Synopsis: Leon Claxton's rise as a Black producer defying Jim Crow laws through bold artistic entrepreneurship.

Themes: Identity, legacy, entrepreneurship

Discussion Questions:

- What obstacles did Claxton face as a Black showman?
- How does the film blend personal and public history?



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
Episode 3: Claxton Takes the Stage

Synopsis: Claxton's early years culminating in his breakthrough at the 1934 Chicago World's Fair.

Themes: Carnival culture, Black ingenuity, survival during the Great Depression

Discussion Questions:

- How did Claxton use performance to subvert oppression?
- What risks did Black performers face on the carnival circuit?



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Episode 4: Sisters, Stars & the Birth of Harlem in Havana

Synopsis: The Bates Sisters rise as headliners while Claxton launches Harlem in Havana, fusing Black and Afro-Cuban artistry.

Themes: Black sisterhood, Afro-Cuban fusion, survival through art


Discussion Questions:

- How did the show challenge ideas of race and gender?
- In what ways was Harlem in Havana both entertainment and activism?


Episode 5: Jim Crow on the Road – Life on Train Car 66

Synopsis: Touring the Jim Crow South aboard Royal American Shows' Train Car 66, performers navigate segregation, danger, and resilience.

Themes: Resilience, segregation, danger on the road, duality of glamor and grit

Discussion Questions:

- How did segregation laws impact Black performers on tour?
- What does Shirley Bates' story reveal about the toll of touring?



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Episode 6: Behind the Curtain – Change is Coming

Synopsis: Backstage during the Civil Rights Movement and Cuban Revolution, the revue faces political and cultural upheaval.

Themes: Political upheaval, artistic resilience, cultural blending, societal change

Discussion Questions:

- How did national and global political shifts affect Harlem in Havana?
- How did performers respond artistically to these pressures?



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
Episode 7: The Fall of the Revue

Synopsis: The revue's final years in the 1960s show risqué performances alongside Claxton's transition to business and philanthropy.

Themes: Evolution of entertainment, boundary-pushing art, legacy and decline

Discussion Questions:

- How did the revue adapt to changing social norms?
- What does this shift indicate about Black entertainment's evolving landscape?



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
Episode 8: Legacy in Motion

Synopsis: Reflections by John Cunningham and Shirley Bates on Harlem in Havana's enduring legacy and cultural impact.

Themes: Memory, sacrifice, legacy, cultural influence


Discussion Questions:

- How does Harlem in Havana challenge mainstream historical narratives?
- What lessons do performers' experiences offer today's artists and activists?

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Activities & Assignments:


- **Critical Essay:** Analyze how Harlem in Havana used performance as resistance during segregation.
- **Creative Project:** Design a 1940s-era Harlem in Havana poster or digital ad.
- **Oral History:** Interview a family/community member about a forgotten story and present it creatively.
- **Archival Analysis:** Examine historical press materials and discuss inclusion/exclusion of performers.
- **Compare & Contrast:** Relate Harlem in Havana to the Harlem Renaissance or contemporary Black art movements.

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





Activity 1: Design a Harlem in Havana Poster

- Use 1930s-40s Black and Latinx visual motifs.
- Include show title, date, venue, and a tagline reflecting resilience and celebration.
- Present in class or display publicly.




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Activity 2: Archival Media Analysis Worksheet

- Analyze historical press materials (newspaper clippings, posters).
- Who is represented or missing?
- What imagery and language are used?
- How do these reflect or challenge societal views of race and gender?



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
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Activity 3: Compare & Contrast Chart

- Compare Harlem in Havana with another Black cultural movement (e.g., Chitlin Circuit, Harlem Renaissance).
 - Include columns: Time Period, Key Figures, Artistic Mediums, Political Impact, Cultural Legacy.



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


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Lesson Plans



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Lesson 1: Exploring Family Legacy and Oral History

Episode 1: Family Legacy in Lights: From Bally to Brown Skin Showgirls

Objective: Analyze how family stories preserve cultural history and shape personal identity.

Materials: Episode 1, discussion questions, notebooks/journals

Activities:

- Watch Episode 1 as a class.
- Group Discussion:
 - How does oral history contribute to cultural memory?
 - What roles do Shirley Bates and John Cunningham play in preserving the legacy?
 - Why might family stories be critical to reclaiming erased histories?
- **Homework:** Interview a family or community member about a meaningful story or tradition and prepare a 3–5 minute oral presentation or a creative retelling (e.g., poem, artwork, video). Optionally share in next class.

Lesson 2: Challenging Jim Crow through Performance

Episode 2: Introducing the Showman

Objective: Understand how performance challenged segregation and racial barriers.

Materials: Episode 2, excerpts from Jim Crow laws or segregation-era texts, writing supplies

Activities:

- [Watch Episode 2.](#)
- Document Analysis: Read and discuss excerpts from Jim Crow laws and firsthand segregation accounts.
- Class Discussion:
 - How did Leon Claxton use entertainment to confront racial barriers?
 - What risks did Black entertainers take by touring during segregation?
- **Writing Assignment:** Write a 1–2 page essay on Claxton's role as an artist and entrepreneur challenging Jim Crow laws, using evidence from the episode and readings.

Lesson 3: Performance as Resistance on the Carnival Circuit

Episode 3: Claxton Takes the Stage

Objective: Analyze carnival culture as a space of cultural resistance and Black ingenuity.

Materials: Episode 3, archival images/articles on carnival shows, poster design materials

Activities:

- [Watch Episode 3.](#)
- Small Group Research: Investigate carnival midways' history and significance in Black entertainment.
- Discuss how these spaces allowed resistance and cultural expression despite oppression.
- Creative Project: Design a Harlem in Havana show poster or digital ad incorporating historical imagery and themes.
- Present posters explaining symbolism and design choices.

Lesson 4: Intersectionality in Harlem in Havana

Episode 4: Sisters, Stars & the Birth of Harlem in Havana

Objective: Explore intersections of race, gender, and cultural identity in the revue.

Materials: Episode 4, scholarly articles on Afro-Cuban culture and Black feminism, writing supplies

Activities:

- [Watch Episode 4.](#)
- Seminar Discussion:
 - How did Harlem in Havana blend Afro-Cuban and African American elements?
 - How did the Bates Sisters challenge norms of race, gender, and nationhood?
 - Discuss the revue as entertainment and activism.
- Essay Prompt: Write a 2–3 page essay analyzing Harlem in Havana as cultural resistance focused on identity intersections.

Lesson 5: Life on the Road – Jim Crow and Harlem in Havana

Episode 5: Jim Crow on the Road – Life on Train Car 66

Objective: Understand the realities and risks of touring as Black performers in the Jim Crow South.

Materials: Episode 5, primary sources on segregation and travel restrictions, touring route maps

Activities:

- [Watch Episode 5.](#)
- Class Discussion:
 - What challenges did the cast face in segregated towns?
 - How did Jim Crow laws affect performers' lives?
 - What does Shirley Bates' decision to leave reveal about the toll of touring?
- Map Activity: Trace Harlem in Havana's touring route, marking segregation laws/events.
- Reflective Journal: Write about how segregation might impact a person's sense of freedom and identity.

Lesson 6: Behind the Curtain – Political and Cultural Change

Episode 6: Behind the Curtain – Change is Coming

Objective: Analyze how the Civil Rights Movement and Cuban Revolution influenced Black and Cuban performers.

Materials: Episode 6, articles/videos on Civil Rights and Cuban Revolution

Activities:

- [Watch Episode 6.](#)
- Research Presentations: Students research and present either Civil Rights or Cuban Revolution's cultural impact.
- Class Debate:
 - How do political/social movements influence art?
 - Can entertainment be apolitical?
- Creative Writing: Write a diary entry imagining you are a Harlem in Havana performer reflecting on the changing world.

Lesson 7: The Fall of Harlem in Havana and Shifting Cultural Tides

Episode 7: The Fall of the Revue

Objective: Examine the revue's decline amid cultural shifts in the 1960s.

Materials: Episode 7, articles on 1960s entertainment culture and LGBTQ+ history

Activities:

- Watch Episode 7.
- Discussion:
 - What contributed to the revue's decline?
 - How did risqué performances reflect wider cultural shifts?
 - What does this reveal about Black entertainment and respectability politics?
- Research: Study drag and gender performance history in Black entertainment during the 1960s.
- Group Presentations on Harlem in Havana's place in entertainment trends.

Lesson 8: Legacy in Motion – Reflection and Reclamation

Episode 8: Legacy in Motion

Objective: Reflect on Harlem in Havana's lasting impact and the importance of reclaiming lost histories.

Materials: Episode 8, reflection prompts, multimedia tools

Activities:


- [Watch Episode 8.](#)
- Group Discussion:
 - How did John Cunningham and Shirley Bates shape the legacy?
 - Why reclaim hidden histories?
 - How does the show influence contemporary Black and Latinx culture?
- Creative Project: Produce a multimedia tribute (video, digital collage, podcast) celebrating Harlem in Havana.
- Final Essay: Write a 3–4 page essay synthesizing the series themes, focusing on honoring cultural legacies.

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


